KEYNOTE SPEAKER



STIs and Doxy PEP:

I completed my internal medicine residency training at the NYP/Weill-Cornell, New York, and fellowship in Infectious diseases/HIV at the Massachusetts General Hospital and Brigham and Women's Hospital, Harvard University, Boston. Prior to that, I did a PhD at the Kirby Institute/University of New South Wales (Australia) in epidemiological studies in HIV/AIDS. My work has focused on impact of weight gain from antiretroviral therapy on diabetes and cardiovascular outcomes; dual-drug therapies for HIV/AIDS; inflammatory markers and clinical outcomes in HIV; and implementation research on improving HIV treatment outcomes in Asia-Pacific, amongst others. Clinically, I'm interested in HIV primary care, cases of HIV with complex resistance history, STIs, COVID-19 therapeutics, and general infectious diseases.

Addressing Unmet Needs: Oral Health



Erika Mott | ACT (Advancing Connecticut Together) Ruth Murray | Hartford Gay & Lesbian Health Collective ACT Oral Health PDSA:

ACT has been working to improve the tracking of our Medical Case Management clients in regards to their oral health care. We've partnered with the Hartford Gay and Lesbian Health Collective to accurately represent clients who are engaged at varying levels and then beginning to use strategies to engage clients who are less compliant as well as folks who are disengaged from their oral health care entirely.



Gigi Chaux Stamford CARES Oral Health Project:

The project aimed to increase Oral Health Screening from a baseline of 13% to 75%. Strategies included first identifying gaps using different QI (Quality Improvement) techniques including Fish Diagrams and mapping, engaging regional partners, and conducting a stand-alone dental clinic event.



Jean Brown GBAPP (Greater Bridgeport Area Prevention Program) Oral Health Screenings:

To better understand the reporting measures, Region 3 of Ryan White Part A conducted a thorough Process Map to understand the gaps in the workflow when clients present to their clinic and how the data is entered into their CAREWare database. This included who entered the information and where so that standardization was possible to understand the entire EMA Oral Health Screenings percentage outcomes.

Whole-Person Care: Housing, Retention in Care, Hepatitis

Healthier Housing Systems = Healthier Youth with HIV:

The housing continuum for youth with HIV experiencing homelessness is broken. Therefore, viral suppression for program's youth experiencing homelessness was at a baseline of 43% (2019). This project sought to increase viral load suppression among youth experiencing homelessness, and improve housing stability and employment.



Marcus Vassell Mercy Housing and Shelter

Housing Services: Retention in Care:

Mercy aimed for a goal of 90% housing stability and 90% of clients meeting care retention goals.

Leveraging a Data to Care Approach to Cure Hepatitis C within RWHAP (Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program):

Collaboration between health departments and clinics is essential to improving Hepatitis C cure for those with HIV/HCV coinfection. Viral clearance and treatment cascades built using data from the health department and clinics can facilitate cure and we will briefly share methodologies for creating these, along with examples of such cascades for the state of CT (using surveillance data provided by DPH) and for a collaborating clinic (Charter Oak). Finally, we will share resources (e.g., training videos) created as a result of the initiative.
